UNDERSTANDING THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CLASSIFICATION

The Library Media Center uses the Library of Congress (LC) Classification system to organize and arrange books, videos, DVDs, etc. on the shelves. The "LC" System divides all knowledge into 21 areas. Each general category is identified by a letter of the alphabet, subdivisions by combinations of letters, and specific topics within categories and subdivisions by a numerical notation.

Guide to Understanding LC Classification

This system uses a combination of <u>letters</u>, <u>whole numbers</u>, and <u>decimal numbers</u> to classify books by their subject content and to organize them on the shelves. It is commonly used by academic libraries because it allows for more precise organization of books by subject and is expandable to accommodate new areas of knowledge. The Dewey Decimal system, another major classification scheme, uses numbers primarily, and is generally used by schools and public libraries.

In the Library of Congress System, the complete call number consists of at least three main parts: the general subject, the specific subject subdivision, and the author. Each part is on a separate line. The top line is a letter or letter combination, the second line is a whole number, and the third line is a decimal letter/number combination. Here is a typical call number:

(letters)	BF	the first line is the general subject, Psychology
(whole number)	408	the second line is the specific subdivision within psychology,
		in this case, Memory
(decimal number)	.B34	the third line combines the first letter of the author's name,
		Bates, with numbers. Always assume a decimal
		point. The numbers on this line are decimal
		numbers, not whole numbers.

Sometimes the specific subject line, the second line [408] is expanded by another line of alpha-numeric characters. In this case, "love" is a subcategory of "affection, feelings, emotions." It is a decimal number also.

Additional lines below the third (or fourth) line are common. These usually provide more specific organization information about the book - publication date, volume number, copy number, etc.

Shelf Arrangement:

Books are shelved by call number classification, reading from left to right.

Line 2: 408	arrangement within the BF's is numerical,	1,2,3,2253554087509999
Line 3: .B34	arrangement of the BF408's is first alphabeti	cal, B , and then numerical as if the number is
	a decimal, .34. Many books will ha	ve the decimal on the spine label; in others,
	the decimal is implied.
